INTRODUCTION OF 2014-15 HEAD START POLICY COUNCIL MEMBERS Standing in for Head Start Director Ann Crowell, Ms. Diane Hill, Pre-K Director, introduced the 2014-15 Head Start Policy Council and recognized the outgoing members, with thanks for providing three years of service. The Board and Superintendent expressed appreciation.

PRESENTATIONS

HEALTH ISSUES UPDATE

Health Services Supervisor Pat Hughes provided the Board with an update on enterovirus safeguards in place at the schools, including a video from the Center for Disease Controls.

EDUCATION FOUNDATION OF ALACHUA COUNTY Referring to their motto of "Continuous Improvement," Ms. Judy Boles, Director of the Education Foundation of Alachua County, presented information on Take Stock in Children; Catalyst for Change; Find It, Fund It; and Senior Scholarships.

Dr. Roberts stated that he would like to help get schools more involved in grants to make sure 'no money is left on the table.'

- Thanked the ACEA for organizing the recent well-attended Rally at Westside Park, in support of efforts to change the state's testing program.
- Reported that EHS student Aaliyah Harris won the 2014 Student Chef Cook-Off in Jacksonville, and she is now a Student Chef Ambassador and will travel throughout Northeast Florida to speak to high school students about healthy eating.
- Enjoyed some time recently in a Pre-K Head Start class at Sidney Lanier.

Reminded Board members of some upcoming events:

- Thanks to Food and Nutrition Services Director Maria Eunice and her team for the honor of developing a lunch dish named *Pasta Roberts* and serving it at schools throughout the District.

Dr. Paulson referred to several events he and most Board members attended, including the NAACP Dinner.

With this being Dr. Paulson's last meeting as Chair, he recounted some of his experiences over the years: Forty-four years in education, Head football coach, Athletic Director, President of the Central Florida Labor Council, Board member. He referred to the year as being a very satisfying experience.

Mrs. Roy thanked Dr. Paulson and stated that the Board benefitted very much from his leadership. Dr. McNealy also expressed appreciation to Dr. Paulson.

CITIZEN INPUT

Mr. Kali Blount, who is associated with the recently formed Black Task Force, reported on their recent African-American History Forum. A book display was a main component, with book circles planned for Black History study. He stated that those who regularly conduct Black History events recognize that children do not know Black history, despite information from the School District's collection of books provided by the state. He gave a brief history lesson.

RISING STAR ACADEMY CHARTER SCHOOL APPLICATION The School Board received an application from The Rising Star Academy (Grades K-5) on September 2, 2014. After a thorough review it is the recommendation of the District's Application Review Committee's (ARC that the School Board deny the application.

Motion by Mrs. Griffin Seconded by Mrs. Roy

<u>Moved</u> the Superintendent's recommendation to deny the Rising Star Academy application, as presented.

RATIFICATION OF DISTRICT ADVISORY COUNCIL (DAC) BYLAWS Dr. Roberts stated that the DAC Bylaws have been in effect for over a year but were never ratified.

Moved to ratify the DAC Bylaws, as presented.

CITIZEN INPUT There was no citizen input.

REVISION OF DISTRICT'S STRATEGIC PLAN

Dr. Roberts stated that this begins the process of incorporating the Board Priorities from the Retreat into the Strategic Plan. He also noted that the finalized Strategic Plan will help the Superintendent guide the work of staff. The Board attorney will also use it to work out the final agreement for the

Superintendent's evaluation instrument.

DISCUSSION OF SYNTHESIZED PRIORITIES After discussion, Chairman Paulson asked Board members to come to the next Board meeting (Nov. 18) prepared to incorporate the Synthesized Priorities into the Strategic Plan. The District Advisory Council (DAC) can then begin development of the final version of the Strategic Plan.

Mrs. Roy wanted to make sure that Impact Fees are included in the list of Priorities.

It was agreed that Board Members could submit their Priorities information to the Superintendent prior to the November 18 meeting.

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BOARD MEMBER/ SUPERINTENDENT REQUESTS

Dr. McNealy was informed that a larger projection screen is on order for the Superintendent's 100-Day Report, and the process is being followed to ensure its timely arrival.

Brief discussion was held on the subject of Board Committee Assignments, with a decision to address the issue at the November 18 meeting.

Dr. Roberts reminded Board members to respond to the 'third tier' of agenda items for future Board meetings. He also noted the upcoming FADSS review of Finance and HR, and the November 18 Food Service Update presentation.

Dr. Paulson requested an update on the Transportation Appeal.
