**AP World History Summer Assignment - 2024 (Due Wed. August 14, 2024)**

*Autobiographical Long-Essay-Question (LEQ): Changes and Continuities of Your Education, 2019 to 2024*

**Directions:** You are to answer the following question for part of your AP World History summer assignment. This handout must be completed before you begin writing your essay. The purpose of this assignment is to help you familiarize yourself with the long-essay-question (LEQ) format and rubric, as well as the historical reasoning skill (HRS) of analyzing historical continuity and change over time.

Complete this outline and attach your essay to the back of this handout before turning it in on the first day of school.

Your essay may be typed or handwritten. There are no length requirements, but it should meet all of the requirements outlined on this paper to receive full points. *Be aware that you do not need to share anything with me that you do not feel comfortable sharing!* You are welcome to write only about academic changes/continuities if you feel more comfortable doing so.

**IMPORTANT:** It is OK (and somewhat expected) that you are unsure or unclear about the expectations of this essay. **JUST DO YOUR BEST.** I will be teaching you more about the rubrics throughout the school year, as well as sharing examples with you. There will be plenty of time to practice and grow. Don't stress about not getting it right on this essay--this task is meant to expose you to the basic outline of the essay and give you some practice. That's my primary expectation for this assignment. Any questions or uncertainties you have will be addressed in class, so please try to avoid asking me questions about the rubric over the summer.

In your response you should do the following.

- Respond to the prompt with a historically defensible thesis or claim that establishes a line of reasoning.
- Describe a broader historical context relevant to the prompt.
- Support an argument in response to the prompt using specific and relevant examples of evidence.
- Use historical reasoning (e.g., comparison, causation, continuity or change over time) to frame or structure an argument that addresses the prompt.
- Use evidence to corroborate, qualify, or modify an argument that addresses the prompt.

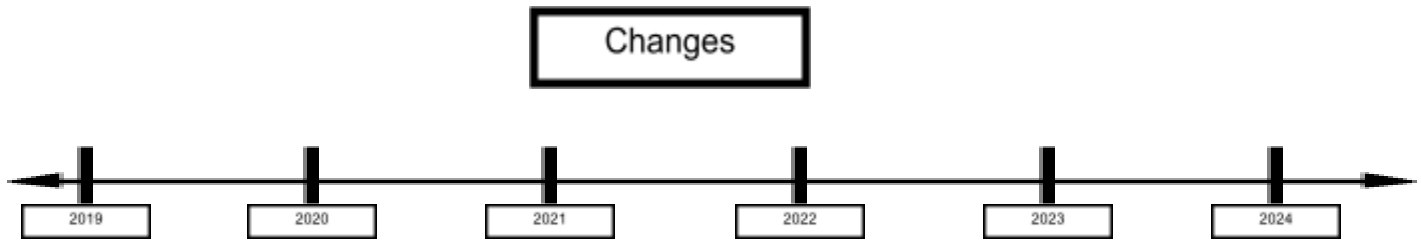
**Essay Prompt:**

Middle school and high school are often seen as periods of growth and development for adolescents in the United States. The transition from elementary to middle school and subsequently middle school to high school often present unique personal and academic challenges and opportunities.

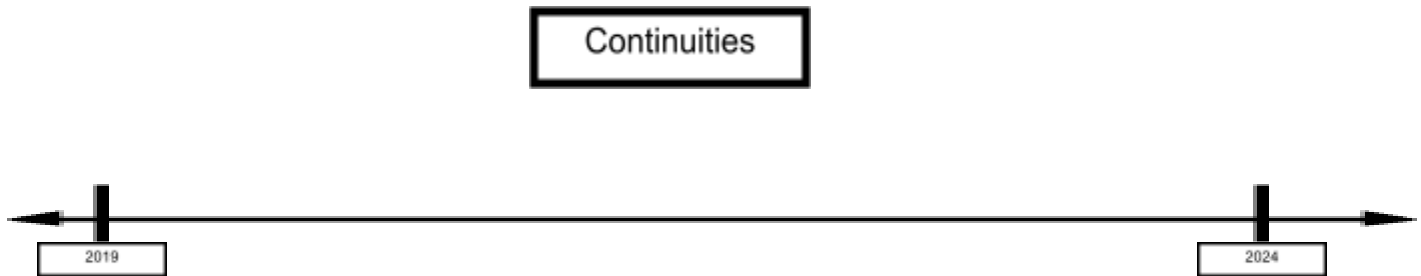
Develop an argument that evaluates the extent to which you experienced personal and/or academic *changes* during the 2019 to 2024 time period.

## STEP 1: DETERMINE CHANGES and CONTINUITIES

Brainstorm THREE (or more) personal and/or academic changes that occurred in your life from 2019-2024.



Brainstorm ONE or MORE academic and/or personal continuities (things that stayed the same) that spanned your life from 2019-2024.



## STEP 2: Provide CONTEXT for your essay.

Context is one point on the long-essay-question (LEQ) and document-based-question (DBQ) rubrics.

Think of context as the background information necessary for understanding your essay topic. Essentially, you are “setting the scene” for your essay. I often explain it in class as the opening “crawl” (yellow text) at the beginning of a Star Wars movie, or the “previously on...” you see at the beginning of shows to summarize what happened on a previous episode or season of your favorite TV show. Contextualization is NOT awarded for merely a word or phrase, but instead requires an explanation typically consisting of multiple sentences. Context appears in the introduction to your essay. There are no length requirements, but good contextual statements are usually around 4-5 sentences long. So, set the scene for your life. Give some background information about yourself before diving into the prompt topic and your thesis. Write a rough outline of your context here.

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### STEP 3: Outline Your Changes & Continuities

**STEP 4: WRITE YOUR THESIS** – The thesis of an essay is your main point or argument. It is essentially a 1-3 sentence summary of your main argument that you will defend with evidence later in your essay. It will come after the context statement in your introductory paragraph. Start off by using the same words from the prompt. I often refer to this as using “*the language of the prompt*” Answer the essay prompt using specific details and evidence. DO NOT simply write “There were many changes and continuities in my personal and academic life.” That is too vague and will not earn you the thesis point. Give specific examples of changes/continuities in your life. For example, “There were many changes and continuities in my personal and academic life. I experienced changes such as .... However, I experienced continuities such as. . . .”

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### STEP 5: WRITE THE ESSAY!

This is essentially a four paragraph essay, but of course you can write more paragraphs if it is fitting or if one of your paragraphs can logically be split. Remember, it can be typed or handwritten. There is no length requirement.

<b>Criteria</b>	<b>Description</b>	<b>Questions to consider</b>
<b>Historical Reasoning: Topic Sentence</b>	Start the paragraph with a topic sentence which asserts that you have experienced certain types of changes.	What are the changes? Can you categorize the types of change (for example, an academic change, a geographic change, as personal change, etc.)?

(This sentence will start with a phrase such as “ <i>For example,</i> ”)  -After each specific example, provide you explanation for why the change occurred	What specific examples of evidence support the topic statement? Did you give specific examples of the continuities and analyze WHY they occurred?

**CONCLUSION PARAGRAPH: Bring it all together for the reader**

<b>Criteria</b>	<b>Description</b>	<b>Questions to consider</b>
<b>Conclusion</b>	Reaffirms your argument (thesis) by explaining how the evidence presented throughout the essay supports each claim (topic sentences). Summarize for the reader, how you supported the argument throughout the essay. <i>Does not merely restate the thesis.</i>	How did the evidence presented throughout the essay support your thesis? Did you answer the prompt fully? Did you make an evaluation of extent (did you mostly change or did you mostly stay the same?)
