

Two Eastside Students Attend Global Youth Institute The right to food is a human right

ducted extensive research on problems associated with access to sufficient food in a specific region of the globe as well as proposing innovations to deal with these problems. Each student then submitted a paper summarizing their research. As part of the Global Youth Institute, students interacted with and attended symposia given by global leaders in science, industry and policy.

Additionally, U.S. Senator Tom Harkin gave a special address to the Global Youth Institute attendees, which was followed by a personal greeting from United Nations Secretary-General, Ban Ki-Moon.

The Youth Institute students helped package 25,000 meals as part of the Outreach International, Inc., toured the Des Moines Water works and participated in an Oxfam Hunger Banquet. The Global Youth Institute experience culminated in a day in which students presented a summary of their research in roundtable groups consisting of students, experts and teachers.

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Students Participate in Breast Cancer Awareness Activities

This year marks the third year since the birth of Eastside's Breast Cancer Awareness club. As always, the months of September and October were very busy for the club. Like last year, the club organized a brunch for breast cancer survivors on Sept.29. Approximately 40 breast cancer survivors gathered at the Thomas Center to savor delicious food and enjoy entertainment provided by various Eastside students in the form of musical performances, dancing and a fashion show.

On Oct. 13, the club was present at the Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk at Northeast Park. Some members were there as early as 6 a.m. to help set up for the walk but starting a bit later the club was in charge of volunteering at a tent for breast cancer survivors. Before the walk, both the Eastside Chamber Singers and the Eastside Cheerleaders performed in front of community members. The walk officially began at 9 a.m. so at that time about 20 of the club's members started walking in honor of breast cancer survivors and to promote breast cancer awareness in the community.

Another priority of the club during September and October was to fundraise for the American Cancer Society. The club's goal was to fundraise \$2,500 to reach the bronze level. However by the day of the walk, the club had exceeded it goal since it had collected over \$3,500 through various means. Overall, this year was once again very successful for Eastside Striders.

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STUDENT INFORMATION

Testing:

Nov. 28 starts our retakes for end of course exams. Biology end of course will be Nov. 28-29. This will be only for those that already took the test or should have taken the test last year. Algebra I EOC will be given Dec. 3-6. Geometry EOC will be given Dec. 10-13. They must have previously taken the EOC to sit for the retakes. Anyone taking it on FLVS this year or during the summer will take it this time as well. Visit our website at east-side.sbac.edu and go to student services and school counseling to see links for practice.

New State Guidelines regarding ACT and SAT Concordant Scores:

Effective immediately the state has suspended any use of concordant scores to replace the FCAT 2.0 for the current juniors and sophomores. A new concordant score will be announced in the fall of 2013. Seniors are grandfathered in with the previous scores. Juniors should continue taking the ACT and SAT and work towards a college ready score of 19 or above in each section.

New Photo Requirement for ACT and SAT:

Both SAT and ACT have a new photo requirement when registering for the test. ACT is now required for all tests. SAT will be required starting with the March test. Tickets and IDs are a MUST now and one cannot enter without both. Watch for deadlines. If your student needs help, please visit us in guidance.

Attendance:

It is that time again to be watching your attendance. Once a student goes over the limit of six unexcused, the state of Florida revokes credit. A student must then pass the midterm or final and the semester in that class to get back their credit. The state of Florida also suspends your driver's license automatically. Keep up with turning in your notes for absences. Plan trips and college visits during our vacation times to avoid excessive absences.

United Way

United Way of North Central Florida was the only United Way in the country to receive a \$300,000 contribution from AT&T, through the AT&T Aspire Local High School Impact Initiative. This two-year contribution will provide dropout prevention services to at-risk 9th graders in three Alachua County high schools: Gainesville, Eastside and Hawthorne. Referred to as Check and Connect, this program is a new part of the continuum of support for United Way's impact area education and is in partnership with Alachua County Public Schools. It will provide outreach and support to more than 120 youth and their families within those school populations.

"The data we collect through this effort will make a lasting impact on our community," said United Way of North Central Florida's President & CEO, Debbie Mason. "Working together with AT&T, we can impact other communities across the nation that struggle to find successful interventions to halt the drop-out rates of students living in poverty."

Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) Grant

United Way of North Central Florida has been awarded a grant from the Corporation for National and Community Service to implement the Alachua County Retired Senior Volunteer Program (AC-RSVP). The primary focus of the grant is to recruit senior volunteers to help improve educational outcomes in the community. Volunteers can also work with organizations to help improve health outcomes and with programs that reduce poverty.
