



The academic year is well underway, and I'm confident it will be a very successful one for our schools and students. Of course, it will also be a year of transition. Our recently-retired Superintendent Dan Boyd has led this

district admirably for the last nine years. The School Board has just begun the very difficult job of finding someone to fill his shoes. In the meantime, I'm honored to serve as Interim Superintendent of Alachua County Public Schools.

I'm committed to maintaining the momentum we've built under Dr. Boyd's leadership. Of course, there will be challenges. One of the most significant is the move to the Common Core Standards (CCS) and the issues surrounding that move, especially in light of Florida's recent decision to pull out of the consortium developing new tests aligned to the CCS. The state is also planning to hold public hearings about CCS this fall.

In the meantime, we will continue to follow the state's timetable for implementing the Common Core Standards. We have been phasing them in for the last two years, beginning with the earlier grades, and are working toward full implementation by 2014-15 as required by Florida law.

We will certainly continue to monitor the activity in Tallahassee regarding CCS, testing and other educational issues. However, I want to assure you that our schools, teachers and staff will maintain the focus on our primary mission of providing students with a high-quality education that will prepare them for future success.

Thank you for your support of our schools and I wish you and your student a very productive school year!

GOLDEN REGIMENT REPRESENTS FLORIDA AT FIRST-EVER BANDS OF AMERICA NATIONAL MARCHING COMPETITION!



Congratulations to the Golden Regiment for earning a Superior rating and coming in 4th Place in Class at its first-ever BOA Super Regional! Thirtynine of the top marching bands in the nation from GA,

AL, AR, LA, OK, NC, SC, TN, OH, TX and FL made up a field of bands which included Grand National Champions and many Regional Grand Champions from the respective states. Buchholz ended up 19th and was only 3.85 points away from being in Finals. This was a solid step onto the national marching band stage by Buchholz. The Golden Regiment is currently the top-seeded Class 4A marching band heading into the State Championship on Nov. 23rd.

<u>PLAN TEST</u>

Buchholz will be administering the PLAN (Pre-ACT Test and Career Interest Inventory) to all 10th graders in November 21, 2013 during 1-4 periods. This is the only date of this administration. The PLAN is free and all sophomores are included in the administration, so signing up is not necessary. Taking the PLAN is a great way to prepare for the ACT, know if your test results are on track for college, and help students find potential careers that match their interests. Students should bring #2 lead pencils and a calculator on this date. More information about the PLAN is available at www.planstudent.org

P.E.R.T. TEST

During the 2011 legislative session, section 1008.30, Florida Statutes, was revised as a result of the passing of House Bill 1255 to expand college placement testing by requiring administration to high school students. The legislation also requires high schools to provide postsecondary preparatory instruction for students who do not meet or exceed the approved test scores.

The P.E.R.T. tests Reading, Writing, and Math skills, and is mandated for all 11th graders by Florida State Statute 1008.30. We will be giving the P.E.R.T. testing during March 2014. More information about the test can be found at the Florida Department of Education website (www.fldoe.org).

Students who do not meet the state's standards will be required to take college readiness courses during their senior year.

ACT VS. SAT PRACTICE TEST

Saturday, November 16 8:00am-12:15pm in the Auditorium @ Buchholz High School. Cost -\$25 In addition to experience with samples of timed ACT and SAT sections, this test is designed to help you determine which exam you will score better on. Students can register before or after school in the guidance office, and during A and B lunch, cash or check (Buchholz High School) are accepted.

FINANCIAL AID WORKSHOP

The PTSA invites parents to a Financial Aid workshop on Thursday, November 14 at 7pm in the BHS Auditorium. Our speaker is Reyonna Parrish from the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OFSA) at the Florida Department of Education. 

HOMEWORK REQUESTS

A parent may request homework by calling the Guidance Department. A minimum of 24 hours advance notice is needed to obtain homework from teachers. If homework is provided, the student is expected to have it completed and turned in to the teacher upon his or her return to school.

IMPORTANT POLICIES

PROHIBITED ARTICLES AND SUBSTANCES

There are several school policies that we wish to call to your attention in hopes that awareness of these policies will make the start of school a satisfying and orderly process for all involved.

- Smoking and tobacco products are not allowed on the school campus, in areas adjacent to the school, or at school sponsored activities on and off campus.
- Drinking or possession of intoxicating beverages at school or school sponsored activities is prohibited.
- Possession or use of drugs and/or drug paraphernalia on school property (including buses), at school sponsored activities, and in any vehicle brought onto school property or to school sponsored activities is prohibited.
- Possession of weapons and the use of weapons on school property (including buses), at school sponsored activities, and in any vehicle brought onto school property or to school sponsored activities is prohibited.
- Walkmans, iPOD's, boom boxes, headphones, CD and DVD players, and similar devices are prohibited.
- Playing cards are prohibited.

The items prohibited above are subject to confiscation by school authorities and any student possessing them is subject to the Code of Student Conduct. The school is NOT responsible for confiscated items.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Buchholz believes that student academic performance is directly related to class attendance. **Parents should encourage students to attend all classes regularly and reserve absences for emergencies.** Students who have more than six unexcused absences in a semester must pass a comprehensive final exam and have a passing grade for the semester in order to earn credit. Notes from a parent or guardian may excuse up to six absences for the following reasons: sickness, injury, death in the family, or some other insurmountable condition. Documented appointments with health care professionals, religious instruction or religious holiday; participation in a school sponsored activity approved by the principal or designee; and court appearances (subpoena required) are excused absences. Documentation excusing absences must be turned into the Attendance Office upon the immediate return of the student to school. Make-up work will not be assigned until a note has been received and affirmed. Absences will not be excused for a previous semester or school year.

In order to change or update your address, you will need two (2) proofs of address. Some examples of a proof of address are: a utility bill, a cable bill, or a HOME phone bill (not a cellular phone bill), your mortgage or lease. If you have any questions about your address change (update), please contact the Zoning Department at 352-955-7700.

Please note: Simply writing your new address on the emergency card does NOT correct your address in the school system.

DELIVERIES FOR STUDENTS

Buchholz works very hard to limit disruptions to the instructional environment of our classrooms. We purposely limit announcements and other items to avoid disruptions during instructional time.

While it is understandable that students may occasionally forget to bring items they need for school, we would like to remind you of school rules regarding deliveries for students. If a student has forgotten something and has requested that a parent bring the item to school, that student should check with the front office **between classes or during lunch** to see if the item has arrived, without notification from the office.

If you must bring cash to school for your student, for lunch or any other reason, please be prepared to wait for your student to be called out of class to come to the front office to pick up the money from you, personally. <u>We cannot accept cash for delivery to students.</u>

We can accept items only from a parent, guardian, or someone listed on your student's emergency card. There are no exceptions. If parents wish to have grandparents, brothers, sisters, or other family members to be able to make deliveries to students, their names must be listed on the student's emergency card.

As always, there can be no deliveries of flowers, balloons, candy, or other non-school related items during the instructional day.

ATTENTION PARENTS

For your child's protection, BHS policy restricts contact with students to parents/legal guardians and those persons who have been authorized by the parents/legal guardians. "Contact" includes checking a student out of school, asking to speak to a student, or making deliveries of any kind (i.e. homework, gym clothes, etc.). This policy covers all "non-parents" including immediate family (siblings, grandparents, uncles, aunts), as well as friends, neighbors, etc. This policy means only those visitors that have been pre-approved by parents may have contact with students. Non-parents can be approved by listing those names on your child's signed emergency card. If you have any questions, please contact BHS at 955-6702.

BRIGHT FUTURES COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS REQUIREMENT

"COMMUNITY SERVICE", is defined as altruistic tasks performed with the intent of enhancing the guality of life in the school or the community at large.

High school students may earn credit for graduation through APPROVED community service. Up to one (1) full credit may be earned, 1/2 credit at a time, for each 75 hours of pre-approved community service. Students may earn two one -half credits by completing 150 hours of service. Community service hours may only be applied to either coursework for credit or community service for Florida Bright Futures Scholars Awards, not both. A student who seeks one full credit for graduation and the community service for Florida Bright Futures, must complete 250 hours of approved community service activities. (ACPS policy 2575.01)

Effective August 20, 2012 all service hours must be **PRE-APPROVED** by your quidance counselor.

COMMENCEMENT PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS

Seniors and parents need to know that in order to participate in graduation exercises, a student must have successfully completed ALL or ALL BUT 1.0 credit of the required academic credits.

BHS and Alachua County Public Schools requires that the administration of all medications on school property (prescription and over-the-counter) must be done by a school employee. The required forms to provide for the routine or occasional administration of medication are available at the BHS Clinic.
