Greetings from the media center! We have had a wonderful first month back to school. The students have enjoyed being able to check out some of their favorite books. Students have been learning about the Dewey Decimal System and how it can help them find books in the media center. They have also been refreshing their memories on internet safety. September is both American Founders and Hispanic Heritage Month. Students will have the opportunity to work on activites related to both of these subjects. Constitution day falls on September 17. 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Third Grade News

Welcome third grade families! We are off and running. It is so great to see everyone back on campus. Our students are already learning about our classroom rules and procedures as well as where things are located on our school campus, and what we expect from all of our Alachua Alligators. In ELA we are learning about author's purpose and how to have constructive conversations. In science we are learning about the scientific method and what it takes to be a scientist. In math we are rounding as well as beginning our math Acaletics. We have had visits from Officer Young, Ms. Davis, and Ms. Harrell sharing with us information on school safety, behavior expectations, and upcoming guidance lessons.

Fourth Grade News

Our fourth grade Alligators have already been working hard and learning a lot! This month in math, we are working on addition and subtraction up to six digits before learning to multiply onedigit numbers by numbers up to four digits. We have also begun our daily Acaletics math club program. Our first monthly Acaletics Scrimmage will begin on September 23. In ELA, we are starting a new curriculum program that we are very excited about. For our first unit, we will be studying the topic of observing nature. We are also working hard in IRLA to become better readers. To help with this at home, we are asking our students to read for thirty minutes each night. Children who read thirty minutes per day are being exposed to at least two million words a year and are twice as likely to be successful at their grade level expectations. We are starting off strong with writing. We will take our first Write Score assessment on September 7. In science, we are studying earth's place in space. We are learning about Earth's rotation and revolution, and the moon's phases. We look forward to a wonderful rest of the year!

Fifth Grade News

Greetings from fifth grade! We are off to a great start this year! Fifth graders have been spending time learning all about their new teacher and classmates, as well as new policies, procedures and expectations. In IRLA time, we have been working on reading stamina and are reading independently for up to thirty minutes. During ELA we have been learning all sorts of new activities and routines to help us become stronger readers. Writing time has included practicing different types of writing and sharing our writing with others. We were also introduced to Acaletics during math time which is a great way for us to learn many math standards in a short amount of time. We have focused on place value in math, but remember it's really important to have those multiplication facts memorized, so keep practicing those daily! In science, we've been introduced to the scientific method and what it takes to be a scientist. Finally, our first lessons in social studies have been focused on geography. Whew! That's a lot of learning in such a short time! Fifth grade teachers would like to remind families that it's very important for students to read at least twenty minutes at home each night and to get a good night's rest each and every night. We are so excited to see what this year has in store for us!

Art, Music, and PE News

Art News:

In September third graders will be working on Picasso portraits with oil pastels. Fourth graders will also be using oil pastels and the art elements of color and line for their warm hands/cold hands project. In fifth grade we will be learning about color theory. Fifth graders will be mixing the primary colors and creating color wheel eyes with tempera paint.

Music News:

Our first few weeks in music have been a blast! We have been learning our music room procedures and how to sit in "musician position." Ask your child to show you "musician position." We even learned proper technique for playing the drums and xylophones. Third grade performed "Say Hello," fourth grade performed "Palo," and fifth grade performed "Zangalewa" on the instruments. Emphasis will be on the importance of teamwork and winning with class and losing with grace.
