#### **STEAM News**

In STEAM for January we are finishing our first big design project with our mazes. Our next project will deal with forces and gravity: designing a model parachute. Students will work to see how changing the size of their parachute affects the drop, as well as how the amount of load in the parachute affects drop. They have worked very hard breaking out of their comfort zones with helming their own projects, and I look forward to seeing what they are able to come up with as they hone their design and engineering skills!



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### **Third Grade News**

Happy New Year! We hope everyone enjoyed their winter holiday break, but now we are back and working hard. Here is what's going on in third grade. We are now in our fifth unit in ELA "Advancements in Technology." This unit is focusing on drawing inferences and distinguishing between important and unimportant information. We will continue to practice how to be "Power Readers." Asking questions as we read, annotating our texts, are "power reading" strategies. In math we are getting more into multiplication and division. Math is moving towards more multi step problems which require reading and understanding. Acaletics is in full swing and we will be having another Green Party. In science we are learning about energy. As you know reading is an important part of being successful in third grade, so your student should be reading daily at home. Ask them questions about what they are reading, and have them predict what may come next in their book. Please be sure to check your child's agendas nightly and initial each day.

### **Fourth Grade News**

Happy 2022! As quarter two ends, our students are taking the district AIMS assessment to demonstrate what they have learned in the last nine weeks in reading, math, and science. As quarter three begins, we will continue with fractions by learning to multiply whole numbers and fractions. With your child, continue to look for ways you can identify and use fractions in the real world! In ELA, we are currently explaining how authors use reasons and evidence to support claims. Next, we will determine and compare the themes (moral/lesson) of stories, myths, and folktales. To practice this at home, have your child identify themes of books, movies, and episodes of TV shows. Continue to read at home for thirty minutes each night! We are improving our informational and opinion essay writing through working on integrating evidence and organizing our ideas. In science, fourth grade is learning about heat energy and how it moves. Fourth grade's fall crops are being harvested and will be prepared in school lunches soon. We will be planting spring crops very soon. We hope you have a great start to your year!

## **Fifth Grade News**

In fifth grade we are back and ready to work hard in 2022! On January 24 and 25 we are honored to participate in a series of lessons, hosted by Next Generation, teaching about the Holocaust. In ELA we will begin a new unit asking "What compels us to survive?" During this unit we will read and analyze a number of texts focused on survival in the wild. In science we will continue to learn about electricity. In math we are busy studying fractions. As you can see, January will prove to be a month filled with learning and fun!

## Art, Music, and PE News

#### **Art News:**

Welcome back! In art, third graders will be learning about careers in art and doing an illustration of a sunflower. Our fourth graders will be creating a collage with geometric shapes and will then be learning about printmaking. In fifth grade, students will be doing pieces for a mini-mural inspired by the street artist "Thankyou X." Art club students will be working on colored pencil techniques and "Saving My Alachua." Artists of the month for January will be announced soon.

#### **Music News:**

We finished off 2021 by studying Pyotr Tchaikovsky's *The Nutcracker* in music class. Ask your child to share what they saw in the *The Nutcracker*. Third and fifth grade students played a passing game to my favorite holiday song "Sleigh Ride." Ask your child what the trumpet did at the end of the song. Fourth grade students decoded words on the music staff and some even began writing their own words on the music staff. In January we will be studying some classical composers and begin being composers ourselves.

### PE News:

**Proper Shoes:** Please make sure your child is wearing proper shoes to school each day and especially on PE day. The ACPS dress code calls for closed toe and closed heel/athletic shoes. Sandals, flip flops, crocs and slides are not safe for school activities. Physical education class is designed to be safe and fun and improper shoes are a safety hazard for students.
