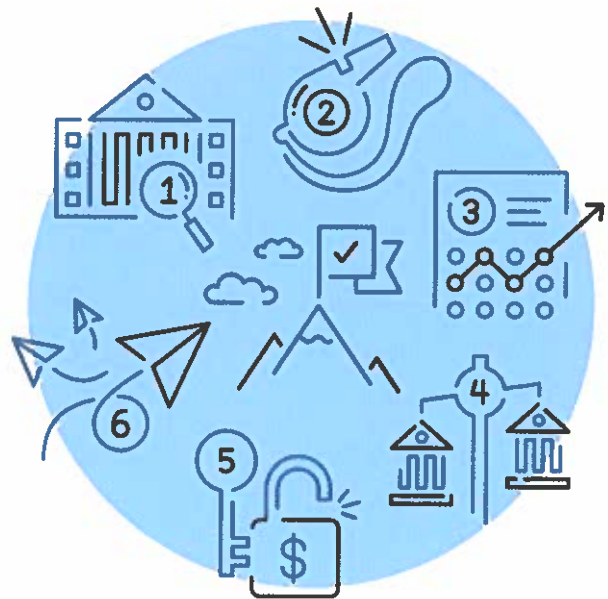


College Board Opportunity Scholarships

A Clearer Path to College



The College Board is investing \$5 million per year in the College Board Opportunity Scholarships, beginning with the class of 2020. Your students are eligible to earn scholarships by taking the following actions during certain windows in their junior and senior years:

The Scholarships	The Actions	Action Window
1. Build a College List: \$500	Build a college list on BigFuture™.	Junior Year: December 10, 2018–June 2019
2. Practice for the SAT: \$1,000	Use Official SAT™ Practice on Khan Academy™ to get ready for test day.	Junior Year and Fall Senior Year: December 10, 2018–October 2019
3. Improve Score: \$2,000	Improve their SAT score.	Spring Junior Year through Fall Senior Year: March 2019–December 2019
4. Strengthen College List: \$500	Strengthen their college list with a mix of academic safety, fit, and reach schools.	Summer and Fall Senior Year: July 2019–October 2019
5. Complete the FAFSA: \$1,000	Fill out the FAFSA form to apply for financial aid.	Fall and Winter Senior Year: October 2019–January 2020
6. Apply to Colleges: \$1,000	Apply to schools they want to attend.	Fall and Winter Senior Year: October 2019–February 2020
Complete the Journey: \$40,000	Complete all six scholarship steps.	Final Drawing: March 2020

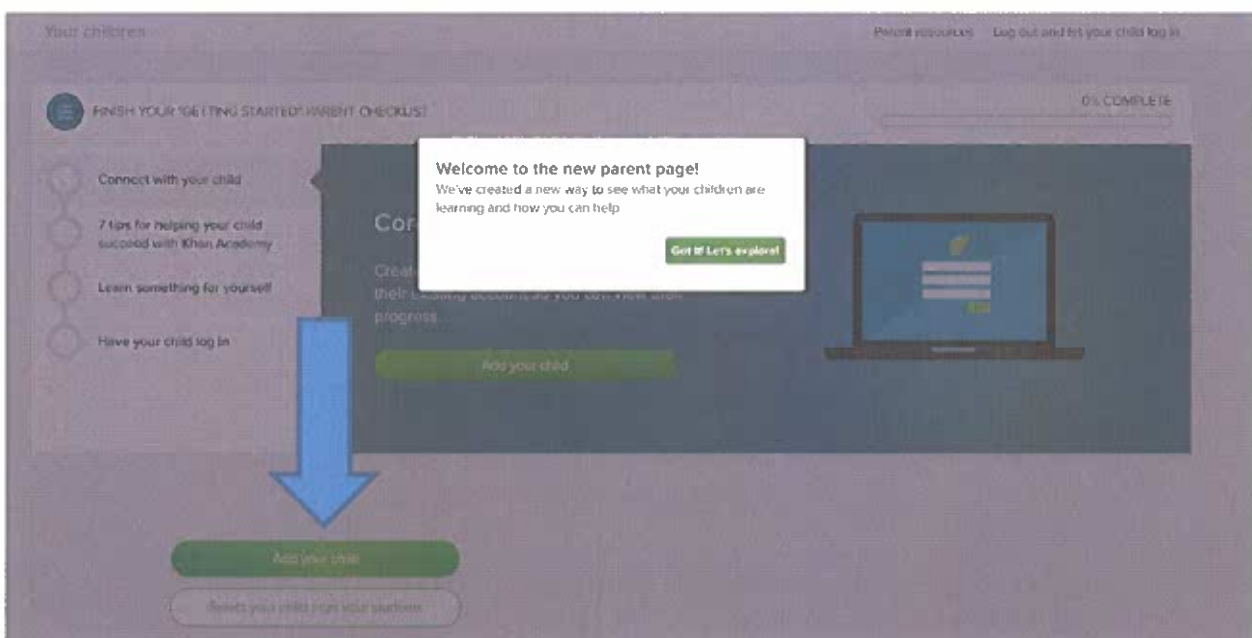
Creating Parent Accounts on Official SAT Practice

1. Parents may create an account at satpractice.org.
2. The parent will select the 'Parent' role when prompted.
3. Once the account is created, the parent will click on their username in the upper right hand corner and select 'Add Children'.

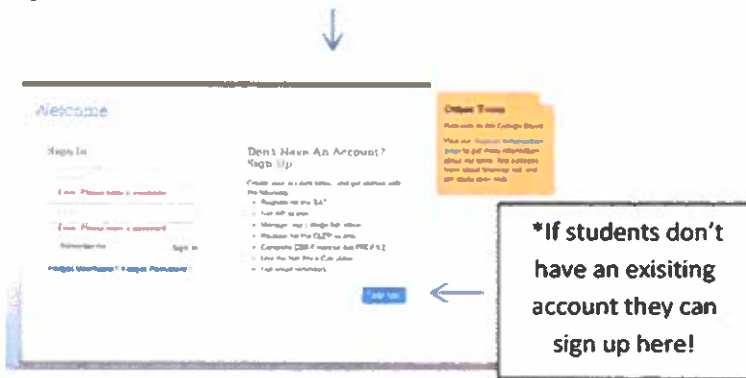
Steps to Linking with Official SAT Practice

- 1: Visit (<https://www.khanacademy.org/sat>)
- 2: Have students click on **Start practicing**

3: Students can sign in to Khan Academy using an existing account, Gmail (easiest), Facebook, or create a new account.

4: Once logged in, students will have two options to choose from:

- (A)** Sign in to CollegeBoard.org and send your test results to Khan Academy. **OR** **(B)** Take your first diagnostic quiz

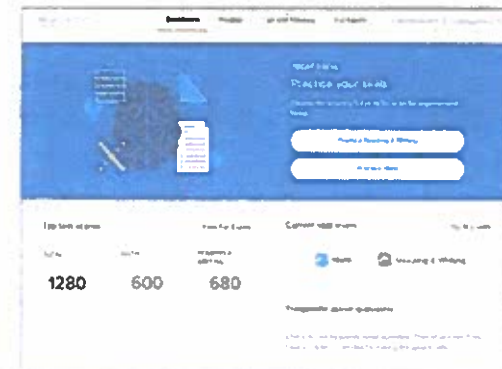

Additional Information

1. **Signing up for a College Board account requires students to provide their given name, date of birth, home address, and an email address. (*If students already have an account, they will be prompted to connect to that account and if they create a duplicate account accidentally they can contact (866) 433-7728)**
2. **Signing up for Khan Academy (Official SAT Practice: <https://www.khanacademy.org/sat>) requires logging in using gmail, facebook, or students using another personal email. Using a personal email, will require the students being able to access that email to finalize setting up their account. Students will be prompted to create usernames and passwords during email signup.**

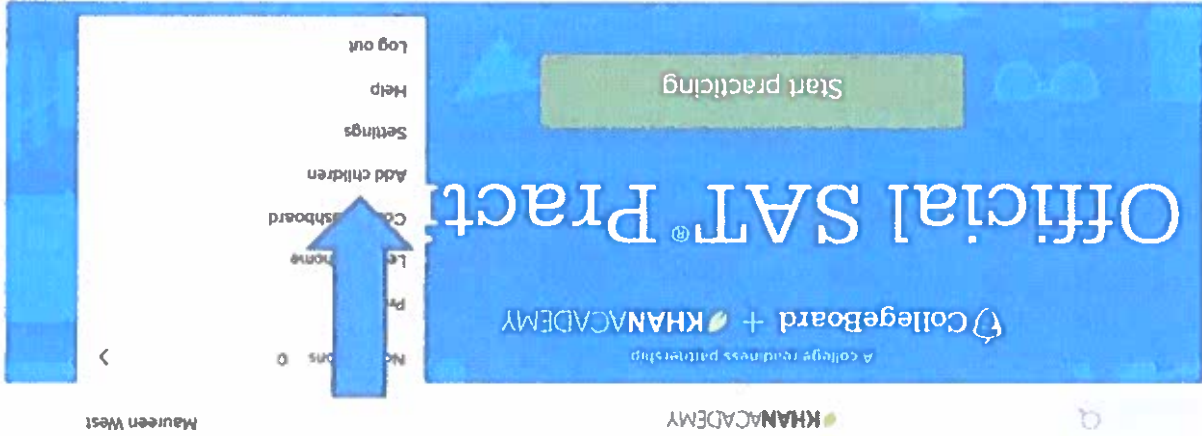

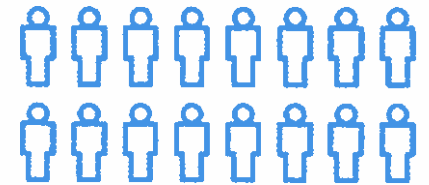
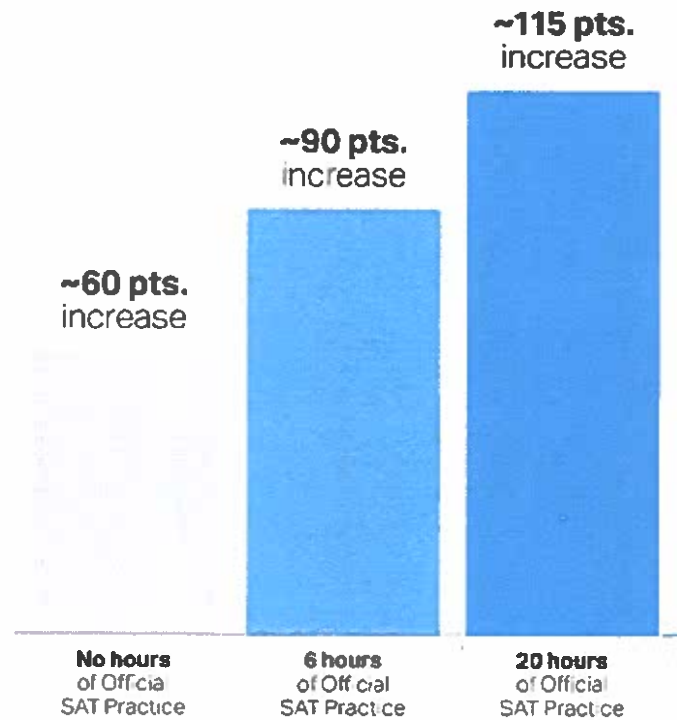
