# Window to apply for academic/career tech magnet programs is Jan. 16 through Feb. 13

#### Magnet program open houses scheduled for January 5--February 5

The window for local families to apply for their child to attend one of the district's academic or career-tech magnet programs during the 2024-25 school year will open 9 a.m. on Tuesday, January 16 and close at 4 p.m. on Tuesday, February 13.

This year 50% of the new students in each magnet program will be chosen through a districtwide lottery. The other 50% will be selected by the school. Students must meet certain academic, attendance and disciplinary criteria to be eligible for each magnet and must also meet program standards to remain enrolled.

The district uses an online process that allows families to apply for more than one program with a single application. The application will be posted on that website when the window opens. Hard copies of the application will also be available at each school.

Each of the district's academic and career tech magnet programs will be holding an Open House sometime between January 5 and February 5 so that families and students can learn more about what they have to offer. # Free virtual mental health services will be available for Alachua County Public School students beginning Dec. 11

Families of Alachua County Public School students who are unable to get mental health services for their children due to cost, the shortage of mental health professionals, work conflicts or other challenges can now get those services at no charge.

Under a new partnership with national healthcare provider Hazel Health, the district is offering 'teletherapy,' or virtual mental health services, to ACPS students in kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade. The virtual sessions are available at home and at school.

Hazel Health connects students with licensed providers for video sessions for short-term mental health support. If long-term mental health services are needed, Hazel's family resource managers will work with parents to connect them with local care options.



Currently Hazel Health serves nearly 4 million students across more than 140 school districts. Therapists help students deal with stress, anxiety, depression, grief, trauma and other issues.

## Changes to magnet and courtesy busing take effect January 16



Families of students who use either magnet or courtesy busing to get to school are reminded that changes are coming to both systems beginning January 16.

In light of the ongoing national bus driver shortage and to reduce late and non-arriving buses, magnet bus stops will be consolidated and courtesy busing limited. Families of student affected by those changes are receiving information directly from the district through email, phone and text, but can also find information on the district's website.

Courtesy busing will mostly be limited to ESE (Exceptional Student Education) and those attending high-needs schools, including Alachua, Idylwild, Lake Forest, Metcalfe, Rawlings, Shell and Terwilliger elementary schools.
